Backsen brings a revived vision to Bonanzaville

Good things are happening at Bonanzaville. The rigorous undertakings are being lead by recently hired executive director Steve Backsen.

"When the executive director position came open, I expressed an interest in it because I feel there is quite a bit of potential we have not tapped into. I hope I can move us in the right direction," said Backsen, who started in mid-March.

He served on the board of directors for two years prior to taking the reins at Bonanzaville.

He has a long history of working with non-profit organizations in the county. These include: director of the Great Plains Food Bank and Island Park Activity Center, campaign director for United Way of Cass-Clay and director of the Fargo Public Schools development foundation.

Engaging the community As Backsen focuses on fulfilling Bonanzaville's mission to preserve and celebrate the rich cultural heritage, he knows there is one public perception that needs to be overcome to get more local people on board.

"People say 'I was at Bonanzaville 20 years ago, what's changed?"

By Amanda Gades Mark Twain died. The Boys Scouts were founded. Mother Theresa was born. It was the year 1910. It was also the

St. Paul's Lutheran Church.

While the pioneer village has remained pretty constant over the vears. Backsen believes a great way to draw people is regular rotation of exhibits in the main museum. Military memorabilia and A Dirty Thirties exhibit opened the end of May.

"We want to engage the community. We want people to think of Bonanzaville as a place they would come to many times a year, not just once a year for Pioneer Days."

The Lucien C. Barnes Pavilion Long-time Fargo area resident

Lucien C. Barnes was a loval supporter of Bonanzaville. He donated half-a-million dollars with a challenge to the general membership to match that. Upon the match, he gave an additional \$500,000 gift.

The funding will be used to construct the Lucien C. Barnes Pavilion, which will be located to the east of the main museum. "This will be one of the biggest, if not the biggest building projects out here," stated Backsen.

The 26,600-square-foot building will have exhibit space, an area for receptions and events, rooms for docents and volunteers to change and a classroom. The new building will

require moving the Arthur Town Hall farther east and relocating the Katherine Depot to near the water tower

A design of the building was completed by Julie Rokke with YHR Partners, Moorhead, Minn. The goal is for construction to begin this summer according to Backsen.

The project is 10 years in the making. It was put on hold because of the 2013 Main Avenue construction project.

"At one time, the thought was to move the main entrance to the east side of the Bonanzaville property," said Backsen.

Main Avenue plans have been finalized and the Highway Department has assured Bonanzaville that visitors traveling east or west will have access to the historical site.

Bonanzaville will also lose a portion of their parking lot. But, they plan on turning 'lemons into lemonade' by enhancing the parking area to make it even more attractive. The adopt-a-building program

Several of the 40 buildings at Bonanzaville have been adopted, but there are still some in need of a group to serve as caretakers including the Land Office Bank.

> Backsen plans on speaking with service groups and individuals about partnering with Bonanzaville. Responsibilities for an adopter include maintaining the building, getting it ready for the summer season and helping with events. Creating a long-term funding source

Backsen is taking a proactive approach on fundraising to create a stable income for Bonan-



Taking stock of leftovers

A bag of turkey scraps may seem an unlikely gift. Sometimes it is those very gifts that can mean the most

When a friend gave me some turkey scraps this weekend, it was a true gift of gold – gold like the color of homemade stock.

The thought of making stock can seem overwhelming. It does take a little extra effort, but it is well worth it. A good supply of frozen chicken (turkey), beef and or vegetable stocks, enhances even the most basic recipe.

Ina Garten, aka the Barefoot Contessa, uses her homemade stocks in a variety of dishes from soups to main dishes to sauces. In her cookbook, "Back To The Basics," she writes: "Nothing gives soup more flavor than homemade chicken stock. It's easy to make on a day when you're around the house; you throw the ingredients in a big stockpot and just let them simmer away for hours. A good chicken stock is rich with chicken, vegetable and herb flavors and will flavor anything you make with it."

She is exactly right about the mechanics of making a good stock.

Homemade stocks are very forgiving - you can use almost anything you want and the results will be wonder-

ful. Once the pots are simmering, vou have plenty of time to take care of a lot of other tasks. Or, time to sit down with a good book - even a good cookbook.

The leftover turkey bits and pieces this weekend, combined with carrots, celery, onion, garlic, some herbs - thyme, rosemary and parsley - and a few other items, made a huge pot of glorious stock. Once it was cool, it went into freezer containers and will be there waiting to be called into a tasty hot pot. Ice cube trays are also great for freezing smaller amounts of stock. Two or three of the cubes can be used when a recipe needs just a little stock.

Whether you use fresh poultry or meat, or leftover 'scraps,' the flavors will add depth to any recipe. A good, basic stock is versatile allowing the use of a variety of vegetables and herbs. Homemade stocks are also a creative way to use those dabs of veggies left from a main dish, or pieces of chicken or other meats. Many people save these odds and ends in the freezer and put them all

together when it is time to make a pot of stock.

Don't wait until someone gives you a bag of 'scraps' - take stock of your pantry and simmer up a pot of gold.

Ina's Chicken Stock

3 5-lb. roasting chicken 3 large yellow onions, unpeeled and quartered

6 carrots, unpeeled and halved 4 celery stalks, with leaves, cut in thirds

4 parsnips, unpeeled and cut in half (opt.)

20 fresh parsley springs

- 15 fresh thyme sprigs
- 20 fresh dill sprigs

1 head garlic, unpeeled and cut in half crosswise

2 tbsps. kosher salt

2 tsps. whole black peppercorns Place chicken, onions, carrots,

celery, parsnips, parsley, thyme, dill, garlic, salt and pepper in a 16 to 20-quart stockpot. Add seven quarts of water and bring to a boil over high heat. Skim any foam that comes to the surface. Lower heat and simmer, uncovered for four hours.

Strain the entire contents of the pot through a colander, discarding

the solids. Pack in quart containers and refrigerate. When the stock is cold, remove the surface fat and refrigerate again.

Bobby Flay's Rich Chicken Stock

4 lbs. chicken bones, chopped 3 large Spanish onions, quartered, unpeeled

1/2 head celery, coarsely chopped 2 large carrots, coarsely chopped 3 tbsps. olive oil

Salt and freshly ground black peppercorns

2 bay leaves

¹/₄ cup whole peppercorns Small bunch flat-leaf parsley, stems only

6 springs fresh thyme Preheat oven to 450 degrees.

Combine chicken bones, onions, celery, and carrots in a large roasting pan; toss with oil and season lightly with salt and pepper. Roast until the bones and vegetables are a rich golden brown, about 30 to 40 minutes.

Transfer the bones and vegetables to a large stockpot, add 12 cups cold water, and the remaining ingredients and being to a boil over high heat. Reduce the heat to

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medium and simmer for four hours, skimming the scum that rises to the top with a ladle every 20 minutes. Remove from the heat and strain through a mesh strainer into a clean pot. Place back on the stove over

high heat and cook until reduced by half. Use immediately or cool and refrigerate.

Stock can be frozen for up to six months.








The top finishers in the boys 14-15 year old division were: (left to right) Garrett Ebach, first; Connor Rieniets, second; and Todd Dent, third.

sets precision agriculture NDSU demonstrations with field day tours

The North Dakota State University Extension Service has scheduled Precision Agriculture Expos in conjunction with the NDSU Research Extension Center field day tours July 12 at Casselton and July 14 at Dickinson.

The exhibitors, field demonstrations and educational presentations will be different at the two expos. The Casselton expo will focus on precision agriculture applications for the predominant row crops grown in eastern North Dakota, while the Dickinson expo will include information and demonstrations relating to both crop and livestock applications

Scheduled field demonstrations at the Casselton expo include AGPS Ditch Pro and AGPS PipeFM software programs used to create surface or tile drainage designs. These software programs are used to design surface and subsurface ditches and provide an automated control while ditching.

A unique field demonstration scheduled at the Dickinson expo is the ProID bale tagger, which is a precision information add-on system for hay balers. It stores bale information collected during the baling and preservative application process and uses this information to create a unique profile of individual bales. Air seeder carts capable of varying fertilizer rates and an ultrahigh frequency cattle tagging system also will be demonstrated.

Field demonstrations scheduled at both expos include tractor global positioning system guidance, satellite imagery delivered on cell phones, section controls on sprayers, row controls on planters, zone command and interstubble row seeding technology on air seeders. Zone command is a new application of control that turns sections of air seeders on and off when operating in areas that already are planted or outside of the field boundaries. Interstubble row seeding technology is used on air seeders to plant between the previous year's stubble rows.

The events at both locations will begin with the regular field day crop plot tours from 9 a.m. to noon. The tours include reports by various

In addition, association and industry representatives will talk about pulse prices and markets. Carrington center speakers include agronomists Greg Endres, Yvonne Lawley and Blaine Schatz; Michael Wunsch, plant pathologist; and Vern Anderson, animal scientist. Other invited speakers from NDSU include Kevin McPhee, pulse breeder, and plant pathologists Sam Markell and Rubella Goswami. Refreshments will be available and a sponsored meal will be served after the tour. 




