Northern Cass' new Reading Art class a success

By Courtney Wilhelm Adding to Northern Cass' list of opportunities for students is a new Reading Art class, introduced last fall. With the school year over, teachers, Miriam Tobola and Anne Nyberg, agree the new class was a success

Reading Art was required for both the seventh and eighth grade. The seventh grade had it in the fall and the eighth grade in the spring. "We wanted to create a class to im-

prove reading scores," said Tobola. "That was its purpose," Nyberg added. As they were hoping, reading comprehension has improved and test scores have gone up.

The decision to try this class began with an idea Tobola had a few years ago. It originated with her interest in book-making. Nyberg agreed to team-up with her to help teach

Tobola presented the idea to Superintendent Allen Burgad, and he

approved. "He was so supportive, right off the bat," Tobola said.

The reading art class was a way of visual learning for the students, designed around literature circles. The students had 13 books to choose from and chose their top three preferences. The class involved a reading day and a discussion day. The students got into groups based on the books they chose and discussed the book. Tobola and Nyberg described it as "like little book clubs.

Students were also required to answer guided questions and write summaries in creative journals they made for the class. The journals were created from recycled text books the students were able to decorate and personalize. Inside the journals, students kept notes on literary terms and other class material.

The students enjoyed the class. "It's fun and you get to be creative," said eighth grader Vanessa Johnson. "It's easier to remember the books you read," added Wyatt Waite, also an eighth grader.

Along with the students' enjoyment of the class, Tobola and Nyberg had a blast with it as teachers.

Over the year, the two realized they have similar teaching habits. They agree the class has seemed to energize them. "We definitely energize each other," Tobola said. Both teachers said they were able to take ideas from the reading art class and incorporate them into other classes.

With the school year now over, Tobola and Nyberg are anticipating another year of teaching Reading Art starting in the fall.

Hope-Page's Linda Miller reflects on 28 years of teaching

By Amanda Gades Hope-Page's Linda Miller grew up in rural Cass County and will retire there after more than 21 years of teaching in the district.

"I'm going to miss the students and the staff. I've learned something from all of the students and will remember all of them," said Miller. Instilling a love of reading

Miller earned a bachelor's degree in education from UND in 1972. Her first position was in Belfield, N.D., near Medora. She taught sophomore English, speech and creative writing for seven years.

In 1979, she married John Miller and moved to the Page area. From 1979 until 1989, Miller did subbing and was a stay at home mom.

In 1989, she was offered a librarian and teaching job in Page.

"When I started, Hope and Page were two completely different school districts. Football was the only sport shared," said Miller. In 1999, the Hope and Page School Districts formed a shared agreement.

Miller has been the Page librarian since 1989 and Hope librarian since 2006. She has many fond memories.

Kindergartners can check out one book of their choosing. One year, while all the other students had already checked out the book that they wanted, a student sat in the corner without a book. Miller asked the little girl what was wrong.

"She had crocodile tears running down her face and she said there are too many books. She couldn't choose just one to bring home.

For some students, it's a delight to read, and for others it is a chore. Miller recalls one whose attitude was transformed.

"He came to school one day and was so mad at me. He said that he had been so engrossed in reading that he had missed his favorite show. I said, 'good!' That was an accomplishment for reading."

There are many students in the district who love to read and others don't, but they won't know if they don't try, added Miller.

She is in charge of processing the books, ordering and inventory management. Students often inform her when new books will be released.

With the current automated system for the Hope and Page libraries, she can easily tell which books are being read and how often. Miller is able to use that information to purchase books the students enjoy.

"In the 21 years I have been here, there was only one book checked out by only me," said Miller.

As a librarian, she also leads story time for kindergartners and first graders, works with third through sixth graders on research projects and teaches library skills to grades kindergarten through six.

Miller also teaches senior speech class and seventh grade English.

She has seen tremendous growth in the students' public speaking skills.

"I like it when the students find out they can actually get up in front of the class and give a speech. They realize they can go through the whole process of picking a topic, researching and delivering it and they didn't die. In all the years that I have been teaching, I have never had a student who was so scared they did not give a speech.'

Past students have come back and told Miller that college speech class was easier because of what she taught them.

Seventh grade English has also been a delight to teach. The students are excited about learning and willing to try a variety of projects she explained. Looking ahead

Miller is retiring just two years after her husband John retired from farming.

"We wanted to retire while we are both healthy and can do some traveling," said Miller. Destinations will likely include Petaluma, Calif. where their daughter, Dani, works as an underwriter for an insurance company; Baltimore, Md. where their daughter, Kyla, works at Johns Hopkins and Pensacola, Fla. where their son Michael is in flight school.

She also plans to do substitute teaching for the district.

Harvest alfalfa at right time

Alfalfa is an important forage for dairy cows because it provides fiber that effectively stimulates chewing while providing energy and protein for milk production.

That means it needs to be harvested at the right time, according to North Dakota State University Extension Service dairy specialist J.W. Schroeder.

Recent warm weather and adequate moisture have the crop nearing the best time to harvest "dairyquality" alfalfa, he notes. While not everyone needs dairy-quality alfalfa, dairy managers and those who seek to provide high-quality forage in that market need to get ready to harvest.

The harvest on alfalfa plots at the North Dakota Agricultural Experiment Station's Main Station in Fargo began this week. Stands at Research Extension Centers to the west are about four to five days behind for every 150 miles they are from Fargo.

"As temperatures rise, the differ-ence will shorten," Schroeder says. "But when to harvest is your decision. However, if you want dairy quality, you better get on the stick. The stick I'm referring to is the PEAQ (predictive equations for alfalfa quality) stick. It's not a new technique, but it is a low-cost, well-tested and reliable method to predict optimum dates for first cuttings by monitoring plant development and quality."

The PEAQ method estimates fiber and relative feed value (RFV) based on the height of the tallest stem and the stage of plant maturity in a sampling area. Approximately 15 to 20 RFV units are lost during harvest and storage, so alfalfa needs to be cut at 165 to 170 RFV, as calculated using PEAQ, to have an RFV of 150 for harvested high-quality alfalfa forage. An RFV of 172 in the field equates to alfalfa 26 inches tall and in the bud stage.

Alfalfa at the Main Station grows about an inch a day. RFV can change three to five points per day in standing forage, so cutting may have to begin before alfalfa reaches a 165- to 170-PEAQ value.

PEAQ predictions are most accurate for good, healthy stands of pure alfalfa.

For dairy-quality alfalfa, the measure of fiber most commonly used to balance diets of lactating dairy cows is neutral detergent fiber (NDF). The optimum concentration of NDF for alfalfa is 40 percent, Schroeder says. Alfalfa containing 40 percent NDF allows reasonable grain concentrations in the diet while maintaining adequate NDF concentrations.

The protein concentration of alfalfa with 40 percent NDF is usually moderate (approximately 20 percent of dry matter), and additions of lowprotein grains such as corn allow flexibility in diet formulation for ruminally undegraded protein while avoiding excessive protein concentrations.

"The first harvest is typically the highest yielding yet the most difficult crop to put up in a timely manner," Schroeder says. "The PEAQ stick is a simple, effective tool to schedule your harvest to achieve forage-quality target levels. However, the method is not designed to balance rations and does not account for quality changes due to wilting, harvesting, storage or weather-related challenges.

Grass tetany possible this spring

Cool temperatures and sufficient rainfall (greater than average in some regions) have many North Dakota pastures set for abundant forage growth this spring.

Weather forecasters predict a substantial warming trend in the next several weeks, and rapid forage growth likely will follow.

"With this in mind, producers with cattle on pasture or planning their spring pasture turnout need to be aware of the possibility of grass tetany," says Carl Dahlen, North Dakota State University Extension Service beef cattle specialist.

Grass tetany, or hypomagnesia, is caused by low blood levels of magnesium and is most prevalent when cows and ewes in heavy lactation graze lush spring growth. Rapidly growing forages have low levels of magnesium, and the availability of magnesium is further reduced by high levels of protein and potassium in the forage.

Animals with grass tetany may experience excitable and erratic behavior, blindness, muscle tremors, a staggered walking pattern and, ultimately, death. The onset of the condition can be very rapid, and the first symptom producers may see is a dead animal.

Forages most likely to induce grass tetany are cool-season grasses (crested wheatgrass, bromegrass, bluegrass and timothy) and annual cereal grasses (wheat, rye, oats). Tetany also can occur in native range pastures when grass growth is rapid and lush.

Producers should consult their veterinarian about a treatment if they observe symptoms, Dahlen says.

Here are some techniques to prevent the disease:

* Encourage daily intake of magnesium. Magnesium oxide is the most common source of supplemental magnesium. Keep mineral boxes

filled and scattered at several locations in the pasture.

* Make sure lactating cows receive 0.20 percent magnesium in the diet on a dry-matter basis. This is equal to 18 to 21 grams of magnesium intake daily.

Use salt mixtures containing magnesium oxide as a magnesium source. To be effective, the mineral mix should contain at least 10 percent magnesium.

* Mix magnesium oxide with other supplements because it is unpalatable.

* Graze legume or mixed legumegrass pastures first because early, lush grass growth is more problematic than more mature forages.

* Graze less susceptible animals on problem pastures. Dry cows, heifers, stocker cattle and cows nursing calves more than four months old are less susceptible to tetany than cows in heavy lactation.

N.D. State Seed Commissioner warns of illegal durum sales

There is renewed interest in planting durum wheat in North Dakota because of the new loan rates that were announced earlier

this month. Since the production of commercial durum has fallen in the state, there has been a parallel reduction in durum seed production, so supplies may be limited or at a distance from demand. The North Dakota State Seed Department reminds producers that brown-bag seed sales are illegal.

Most durum varieties planted today are protected by Plant Variety Protection (PVP) Title V, which states the variety may be sold only as a class of certified seed, according to Ken Bertsch, North Dakota State Seed Department commissioner.

The buyer's proof of certification is either a valid seed tag or a bulk sale certificate issued by an official seed certification agency such as the State Seed Department. Seed sellers are required to provide this documentation with each container of certified seed sold. Seed regulatory agencies may ask for these documents when examining potential seed violations

Additionally, North Dakota seed laws require that seed sold in North Dakota be labeled with specific information regarding the variety and quality of the seed in the container. The full name and address of the person who labels or offers the seed for sale also must be included. Proper labeling is required for all seed, whether it is a protected variety or

Brown-bagging seed is considered by some as a way to circumvent the legal process of seed sales and the payment of royalties or research fees to the variety owner. Violators of PVP Title V seed law may be fined. Those fined can be the conditioner, seller, buyer or anyone who assists in the unauthorized sale of protected

varieties. While it is permissible for a farmer to save seed that he or she has legally acquired to plant on the farm, farmer-to-farmer sales of binrun seed are illegal. It also is illegal for a seed conditioner to clean seed for selling that a farmer has saved.

With the announcement of durum loan rates, brown-bagging of seed became an immediate and major concern," Bertsch says. "Aside from communicating and reminding the industry of the rules and law, investigating potential violations becomes the highest priority. We will have to remain in the enforcement mode long after the 2010 crop is planted. I cannot emphasize strongly enough that if it isn't a legal seed source, don't sell it and don't plant

Under current circumstances, given the unanticipated demand for durum seed, the temptation to circumvent seed laws by accessing seed from a neighbor may be strong.

"Participants in illegal seed sales must be aware that the consequences of breaking seed laws are stiff for both buyer and seller," Bertsch says. The fine can be up to \$5,000 per sale for violating PVP laws. Variety owners also will go after violators, and they can collect up to triple damages

for the seed sold and the production from illegally acquired seed. It is the responsibility of all parties involved to understand the PVP laws."

Seed certification ensures that high-quality seed of known genetic identity and purity is available to the agricultural industry.

"Illegal seed sales are detrimental to the entire seed industry," says Steve Sebesta, deputy seed commissioner. "The Seed Department monitors seed sale activities, including advertisements placed in state newspapers and trade magazines. Regulatory inspectors are in the field investigating activities related to illegal seed transactions and will actively pursue violations throughout the year. Recognizing the special nature of the situation regarding durum plantings, the Seed Department will work with other agencies and seed industry partners to investigate violations and enforce seed laws.

Crop Market Advisor: How will the market balance record corn production and use? By Frayne Olson, Crops Marketof 10 percent ethanol blend for gasothe expected old crop carryover of 1.74

The May 11, 2010, World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates (WASDE) report confirmed the current grain market expectation for a record corn production, near-record soybean production and a more than a sufficient wheat crop. The combination of comfortable carryover stocks, the expectation for large crop production and price-sensitive buyers will result in limited price movement from current levels unless there is an unexpected shock to change expectations.

In this Market Advisor, we will review the corn supply and demand information released in the WASDE report and then consider some of the possible shocks that may create pricing opportunities. Future Market Advisor columns will analyze the soybean and wheat outlook information.

The May WASDE report provides updated estimates for the 2009-10 marketing year (old crop in storage) and the first projections for the 2010-11 marketing year (crop currently being planted). There were relatively minor adjustments made to the 2009-10 corn estimates when compared with the April report. However, the projections for the 2010-11 marketing year provide insights into several of the key fundamental variables that will influence both new and old crop prices

Typically, historical trend line yields are used as initial estimates for national average yield values. This yield estimate then is adjusted throughout the growing season using subjective estimates or field estimates later in the summer. The initial 2010-11 estimated national average corn yield is 163.5 bushels per acre, which is 2.7 bushels per acre above the 10year trend line yield of 160.8 bushels per acre. This is 1.2 bushels per acre less than the record average corn

billion bushels, plus a small amount of corn imports and there is an estimated 15.12 billion bushels of corn available for use in the 2010-11 marketing year.

The question becomes how these bushels will be used and how much is expected to be in inventory at the end of the marketing year.

The three major uses of corn are animal feed, industrial use and exports Feed use is expected to drop slightly from 5.38 billion bushels in 2009-10 to 5.35 billion bushels in 2010-11. In general, livestock numbers and meat production are expected to increase in 2010, with the exception being a 2.2percent reduction in beef production. Part of the reduction in feed use can be explained by an expected increase in corn used for ethanol production and the resulting larger supplies of dried distillers grains. Dried distillers grains can be used as a partial substitute for whole corn in many livestock rations

The WASDE report forecasts an increase in food, seed and industrial use from 5.73 billion bushels for the 2009-10 crop to 5.95 billion bushels in the 2010-11 crop. Food and seed use of corn is relatively small and stable when compared with industrial use. Industrial use can be subdivided into ethanol, which is the largest segment; high-fructose corn syrup; starch; cereal; and beverages. The nonethanol industrial use also is relatively small and stable. The ethanol portion of industrial use has been the hot topic in the corn market for the past several

Approximately 4.6 billion bushels of corn are projected to be used within the ethanol industry during the 2010-11 marketing year. This is roughly 35 percent of total corn use, so just more than 1-in-3 bushels of corn will be sold to an ethanol plant. For comparison, approximately 4.4 billion bushels of line. The ethanol industry is growing at a rate where total industry production soon will exceed 10 percent of the gasoline used within the U.S., which is sometimes referred to as the "blending wall". Once this point is reached, additional ethanol either will need to be exported or used by flex fuel vehicles that can utilize E-85, which is an 85 percent ethanol and 15 percent gasoline blend.

There is a proposal under review by the EPA to increase the maximum blend rate to 12 or 15 percent. The current market expectation is that the blend rate will be increased and the growth in ethanol use will continue. However, this policy debate will need to be followed closely

The export market is the final major use of corn. Corn exports for the 2010-11 marketing year are forecast at 2 billion bushels, which is slightly larger than the 2009-10 estimate of 1.95 billion bushels. While export use is not as large as feed or ethanol use, exports tend to be more variable and harder to predict. As a result, export levels can have a significant influence on market prices.

A recent example is the strength seen in corn prices after the announcement of relatively small corn sales to China. China has been a major market for U.S. soybeans for several years but is typically either self-sufficient or a net exporter of corn. Many cash and futures market traders are debating whether the small Chinese purchases of U.S. corn is a signal that it will have a significant shortfall in domestic production and needs larger purchases in the near future or China is just using a strategy to fill a temporary gap in the domestic supply chain. If China returns to the international corn market and makes large purchases, U.S. corn prices should respond with a noticeable rally.

Given the forecasts for record corn

yields reported in 2009.

A 2.7 bushel-per-acre adjustment may not seem like a significant change. However, when 2.7 bushels per acre is multiplied by an estimated 82 million harvested acres of corn, the bushels begin to add up.

The higher yield estimate was used to adjust for the greater yield potential from early planting. This is a reasonable adjustment given the current good soil moisture conditions across the core U.S. growing regions, improving corn genetics and rapid planting progress. However, we are just beginning the growing season and a lot of things can happen before the 2010 crop is harvested. As always, growing season weather will be a critical variable that influences crop prices.

The combination of increased 2010 corn plantings and near-record yields per acre would result in a 13.37 billion bushel corn crop, which would surpass last year's record corn production of 13.11 billion bushels. Add

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corn is expected to be used for ethanol production during the 2009-10 marketing year.

There were two key federal policy assumptions made to arrive at the 4.6 billion bushel estimate for ethanol use. The first assumption was that the federal ethanol blender's tax credit, which is scheduled to expire on Dec. 31, 2010, will be renewed or extended. The current market expectation is that the blender's credit will be renewed. However, a similar credit for biodiesel production was allowed to expire and has severely reduced the profitability of the biodiesel industry. If the blender's credit is not renewed or extended, the ethanol industry could face another round of financial hardship and restructuring.

The second assumption is that the current 10 percent maximum ethanol blend rate for gasoline will not restrict ethanol use. The current Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulations have placed a maximum

production and record total use, the 2010-11 ending stocks are projected to be 1.82 billion bushels. While this is considered large by historical standards, it is not large when viewed as a percentage of total use. The projected stocks-to-use ratio for the 2010-11 marketing year is 13.7 percent, which is below the 15-year average of 14.4 percent. This is considered a comfortable ending stocks level, but not excessive.

Tracking the dynamics of the corn market is challenging because of the diversity of uses for corn. Spending a few minutes each day to follow market information can pay big dividends in your farm's net income.







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Carl and Anita Hovland are people of the land - patient, persevering and persistent. Their homestead near Ayr tells their family story. Like the crops emerging from the land, the Hovlands house has literally grown from its own roots of concrete buried deep in the ground. "We built the basement first and that's where we lived for five years with our three young children," Anita says. "We did add bedrooms upstairs, but that's all.'

Today the house, which Anita and Carl designed and built themselves, has evolved into a spacious and lovely sanctuary. From the veranda along the front of the house, visitors are welcomed through the doors. A sense of peace and tranquility spreads from the broad prairies to the inside of their home.

Salmon Quiche

15 oz. can salmon (remove bones and skin)

- 4 eggs, beaten
- 1 tbsp. cocktail sauce
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. pepper 1 clove garlic, minced
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup shredded mozzarella
- 1 cup cream
- 1 tbsp. pimento
- 1 tsp. dill weed
- ½ tsp. salt
- ¹/₂ cup shredded cheddar

Mix all ingredients; pour into a 9" unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees until set, about 40-45 minutes

Apple, Cheese and Celery Salad

- 1 egg, beaten
- ³⁄₄ cup sugar
- 2 tbsps. flour

1/8 cup vinegar plus water to make one cup

Combine and cook these ingredients until thick, using wire whisk to blend. Cool and pour over the following:

3 medium apples, cored, diced and unpeeled

3 stalks celery, diced

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cheddar cheese

- make the dressing the day before - add a little milk if it gets too thick. For the salad, use any kind of apple; grated cheese or cubes. It's a pretty green and red salad. Once it is mixed, it's best if eaten immediately

Sweet and Sour Pork

Anita says this is one of their family favorites. It is a little time consuming to prepare, but well worth it. It's an excellent way to use leftover pork or chicken. Start cooking the rice first and it'll be done when the Sweet and Sour is ready, Anita says

Vegetables: Coarsely dice one medium onion and one large green pepper; drain one small can of pineapple chunks, reserving juice for the sauce. Stir fry these ingredients until slightly soft; set aside.

Meat: Heat ½ cup oil in a large skillet over medium high heat. In a small bowl, toss one cup leftover pork or chicken (cubed), 1 tsp. salt and one tbsp. cornstarch. In another bowl, beat one egg and a ¹/₂ tbsp. flour; pour this mixture over meat and mix well. Gradually add meat to the hot oil, turning once or twice until golden brown. Drain on paper towels.

Sauce: Bring to a boil: 1 cup water, ½ cup pineapple juice, ½ cup sugar, ¼ cup ketchup, ¼ cup vinegar and 1 tbsp. soy sauce. In a small bowl, mix two tbsps. cornstarch and two tbsps. cold water until smooth. Gradually add to the sauce mixture; cook until thickened.

Stir the vegetables into sauce; heat through. Just before serving, stir in the meat. Serve over rice and/ or chow mein noodles.

Carl, who farms the family land, can always look forward to Anita bringing lunch to him in the fields when she is home. When she isn't around, there is always something quick and easy he can find when hunger strikes.
